## Marino, Barletta on WVIA Feb. 10

U. S. Rep. Tom Marino, of the 10th Congressional District, will join colleague, Rep. Lou Barletta, 11th District, for a live broadcast on WVIA-TV Thursday night. The two freshman legislators will be the guests on the "State of Pennsylvania" program to be broadcast from 7 to 8 p.m. on the PBS station. Host is Bill Kelly. The one-hour show will be broadcast live from the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C., where Marino and Barletta have been serving since their swearing-in on Jan. 5. ## Rep. Marino spends busy week back in the 10th District

Rep. Marino's first official Constituent Work Week was a busy one for the new congressman, even with snow and ice playing havoc with his schedule.

He started off the week, on Monday, Jan. 31, with a visit to Wayne Memorial Hospital, Honesdale, for a tour of the facility and discussions about health-care access, community health center funding and the hospital's desire to be an outreach clinical site for veterans. Pike County Commissioners Richard Caridi and Harry Forbes were on hand to support the hospital's request to the Veterans Administration and urged Rep. Marino's support.

The congressman explained his stand on health-care reform and said he voted to repeal last year's health reform law because "a government takeover of health care would damage the American economy."

David Hoff, the hospital's chief executive officer, pointed out that Wayne Memorial is "Medicare-dependent" and along with its affiliated community health centers, employ more than 1,000 people, making them the largest private employer in Wayne County.

Rep. Marino visited hospital staff and patient care areas and stopped at the Honesdale Family Health Center.

On Thursday, the congressman toured the Veterans Administration Hospital in Plains Township which serves a large portion of Northeastern Pennsylvania, and toured the Gen-tex Corp., a Carbondale manufacturing plant.

Friday, Feb. 4, was a jam-packed day for the congressman. He visited the Guthrie Clinic in Sayre; met with officials at Memorial Hospital, Towanda; and toured three Bradford County manufacturing plants: EI DuPont; Global Tungsten; and Towanda Metadyne.

Rep. Marino was the guest speaker at a luncheon hosted by the Central Bradford Progress Authority in Wysox Township.

During the 35-minute speech and question-answer session, Rep. Marino discussed plans for creating private-sector jobs, the unrest in Egypt, the use of vehicles that run on compressed natural gas, and his support for an immediate \$75 billion to \$100 billion in federal cuts when the debt ceiling is raised in March.
